### Digging Deeper with Bird Books

For most of us birding apps have added a wonderful new dimension to our birding, by providing a ready reference in our pocket, by helping us learn bird-songs, or by luring birds to us as our phones masquerade as territorial males. Books, however, remain important, as the dog-eared guides that kick around in our cars and backpacks will attest.

I'm looking forward to the second edition of "The Sibley Guide to Birds", due out in March. While we're all waiting for the new Sibley, I have some other books to recommend.

Are you frustrated by companions (you know who you are) who can spot and ID hawks at great distance? Usually while I'm scratching my head and asking "How far above the horizon?" "Hawks at a Distance" by Jerry Liguori provides numerous photographs of raptors in flight so that you can become accustomed to their profiles and color patterns. Fair warning: you may feel like you need your binoculars or a magnifying glass to look at the pictures!

An easier book to use for raptors may be "The Crossley ID Guide, Raptors", by Richard Crossley, Jerry Liguori, and Brian Sullivan. As in his eastern field guide, Crossley displays a montage of photographs against an appropriately scenic background to illustrate many examples of each species. He covers all thirty-four species of diurnal raptors. The



photos are generally larger than in the preceding book, and will help with both close-up and distant identification.

Another excellent guide to birds in flight is the "Peterson Reference Guide to Seawatching", by Ken Behrens and Cameron Cox, which covers Eastern Waterbirds in Flight. When I ordered it, I expected a guide to seabirds, but it includes ducks, gulls and terns as well. It is jam-packed with photographs, as well as range maps, and a guide to places along the east coast that are great for sea watching from land.

For those who like to go to Riverlands or to Niagara Falls in winter to scrutinize the flocks of gulls, Peterson has another reference guide, "Gulls of the Americas", by Steve Howell and Jon Dunn. It devotes over 500 pages and thousands of photographs to the 36 species of gulls known to occur in North America. It shows every conceivable plumage and many subspecies...enough to give even a gull lover a headache.

Lastly, my newest acquisition is "Rare Birds of North America", by Steve Howell, Ian Lewington and Will Russell. It doesn't cover threatened and endangered birds (for which see, "The American Bird Conservancy Guide to Bird Conservation"). It is a guide to birds from Europe, Asia and Latin America, which show up on our shores periodically as vagrants. It looks like a handy book to have along on trips to Alaska or southern Arizona.

Of course the best place to study birds is in the field. So look at our new spring and summer field trip schedule and join our leaders in the field!
