November and December may well be my two favorite months involving birds.

November's star, of course, is the Thanksgiving turkey, which I like partly because it tastes so good and partly because Madison Avenue hasn't figured out a way to start selling it months ahead of time.

The attraction in December is the annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC). There are so many reasons to look forward to this event! Here are just the most compelling;

- For those of us with the energy, stamina, and tolerant spouses, *it's an all-day field trip*. I can make my plan in advance: nothing else gets done today.
- *Every bird matters!* Because the CBC involves an effort to count every individual bird we see, every House Sparrow and Carolina Chickadee makes a difference, and is a cause for at least some rejoicing.
- *Everybody can contribute.* First, most of the birds we see and tally are the common birds most everyone can identify: Canada Geese, American Robins, Northern Cardinals, Dark-eyed Juncos, and other familiar species. Second, the "eyes have it." The more observers we can pack in a car or on the trail, even if all they do is shout and point when they see a bird—the better we do. As long as

one birdwatcher in the group knows their stuff, success is assured.

- *It's a little bit competitive.* Most of us downplay this, but secretly we all hope to find the one bird no one else has seen that day—a Common Yellowthroat lingering on its way south, or maybe a Peregrine Falcon! Because CBC participants gather at the end of the day to report and count their birds, there is always an audience for our personal triumphs. When David Blevins, the Springfield CBC recorder, asks at the end of our tally, "Did anyone see anything not on the list," it's great to be able to say, "Yes!"
- *The results are meaningful.* The Christmas Bird Count is conducted year after year in the same count circles during the same time period. Because data are gathered in over 2,000 locations across the continent, biologists and ecologists can use the information to draw important conclusions about what is happening to birds over time.
- *It ends with a potluck.* As I mentioned above, at the end of the day all the event's participants gather together to report the counts from their respective parts of the circle, and to share a meal. It's Thanksgiving all over again!

I hope you will plan to join us this year, even if you've never participated in a Christmas Bird Count before. Either come to the brief planning meeting at 7:00 p.m. Tuesday December 6 at the nature center, or give me a call at 889-9940. We'll see that you get connected with a team!



At the conclusion, each teen may apply for a

\$250 grant to develop a project in their school or community. If the student works with a Mentor Team, they may leverage their grant to \$500, or can work together to pool grant funds.
